"In this concert," says conductor Rinaldo Alessandrini, "I have focused on the uniquely Italian

The drama in these works arises from the intricate give and take of musical conversation – the delicacy of a small group of soloists mixed with interjections from the larger group of strings. Throughout the *concerto grosso*, one feels the sound build, as if a massive, elegant Baroque palace is materializing out of pure sound. I hope that you will not only be drawn in by the beautiful melodies, but also challenged by the skillful interplay of harmony, counterpoint and ritornello.

San Francisco's Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra has been dedicated to historically-informed performance of Baroque, Classical and early-Romantic music on original instruments since its inception in 1981. Under Music Director Nicholas McGegan, Philharmonia was named Musical America's 2004 Ensemble of the Year, and, according to Los Angeles Times critic Alan Rich, is "an ensemble for early music as fine as any in the world today." The Orchestra performs an annual subscription season in four cities in the San Francisco Bay Area, and is regularly heard on tour in the United States and internationally. The Orchestra has its own professional chorus, the Philharmonia Chorale, and also welcomes eminent guest conductors to its podium. Among the most-recorded period-instrument orchestras in the United States or Europe, Philharmonia has made twenty-four highly praised recordings for Harmonia Mundi, Reference Recordings and BMG, and has also released a number of self-produced compact discs and digital recordings.

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
